

Derwent Valley Mills World Heritage Site Selected to Host Major International



Cromford Mills has been selected as the first UK venue to host the prestigious European Route of Industrial Heritage (ERIH) Annual Conference at the beginning of October.

ERIH represents more than 1000 industrial heritage sites in over 40 different European countries and many of them will be travelling to Derbyshire for the time to take part in the 3 day event, which will also include a VIP reception hosted at Derbyshire County Council Headquarters on Wednesday 1st October, a Gala Dinner at the Railway Roundhouse in Derby on the evening of Thursday 2nd where Euro MP Andrew Lewer will make the keynote speech, and tours of the many sites within the Derwent Valley Mills World Heritage Site on Friday 3rd.

The theme of this year's conference is "Networks of Industrial Heritage. Founding - Managing - Funding - Marketing" and presentations will take place throughout the day on Thursday $2^{\rm nd}$ at Cromford Mills

Day delegate rates are available for non ERIH members who are interested in the development of tourist routes, regional festivals, and the market for industrial heritage tourism

Sarah McLeod, Chief Executive at Cromford Mills said "We are delighted to be hosting such a prestigious event here at Cromford Mills at a time which is so significant in the development of this internationally recognised site. The first phase of our multi million pound regeneration programme is due to open soon and it will be a real pleasure to show delegates just how much has been achieved here in recent years. I am also very keen to develop links with our European partners: putting Derbyshire on their radar not just as a visitor destination but also as a fantastic centre for business innovation".

Museum Offers Unique Way to Honour Fallen World War One Soldiers

Members of the public will be able to knit a poppy on the same type of hand-powered machine that was used to knit socks for soldiers during the Great War to honour Nottinghamshire's fallen soldiers. This one-off opportunity, on Saturday 11th October, is free of charge, and is part of a wider knitting day being held at the Framework Knitters Museum, Ruddington, for BBC Radio Nottingham's Big Poppy Knit campaign. The Big Poppy Knit campaign, organised by BBC Radio Nottingham as part of the World War 1 centenary, has been created to commemorate the people who lost their lives during WW1. They are asking members of the public knit or crochet 11,000 poppies to mark each of the 11,000 Nottinghamshire men who fell during the war. The poppies will then be donated to the Royal British Legion to be sold as part of the Poppy Appeal. The knitting day, which will run from 11 am to 4 pm, is open to all ages, and both knitters and non-knitters. The knitting machines that will be used to knit the material for the poppies, called Circular Knitting Machines, are really easy to use so can be used by children and those with no knitting ability. For those who can knit there will be space in the tea room to sit and create poppies, with a variety of patterns available. It will be free to take part in all activities. In addition to the poppy knitting all visitors will also be able to see the newly redeveloped museum for free that day. For more information on the Framework Knitters Museum visit


The Poppy Trail is suitable for families as there is a parallel trail for children.
