

First Nottingham Local History and Archaeology Day

NLHA's Chairman John Parker spoke to an audience of 60 people on Saturday 21 July 2014 at the First Nottingham Local History and Archaeology Day held at The Djanogly Recital Hall of the University of Nottingham. 34 local history and archaeology societies along with museums, regional archaeological units and heritage groups took part with displays and exhibitions of their work. Moreover, there were two large galleries full of archaeological material so people could handle everything from Palaeolithic hand axes to Saxon pottery and learn how to identify Roman coins. There was also the opportunity to have artefacts identified and with the Historic Environment Record and Portable Antiquities database present people could find out about archaeological work near where they live. John's pres-

entation was a social and cultural background on the topic of memorials and graveyards staring with pre-Christian traditions and Roman burial practices, moving through the English Reformation and Civil War and ending with the Victorian experiences which resulted in the 1852 Burials Act which is still the legal basis for 'proper' burial in England. Nottinghamshire Local History Association also had an exhibition stand featuring gravestones; Robert Howard (and new display banners) promoted heritage bus tours.





Nottinghamshire Graveyards Project

The NLHA, in partnership with Nottinghamshire County Council (Community Archaeology) and the Nottinghamshire Wildlife Trust are applying for funding to develop a 5 year project. Our project focuses on the heritage of every village and town in the County. The parish Church and its Churchyard have for centuries been at the heart of our communities. Churchyards contain a wealth of information about people and families, not just names and dates, but relationships and stories; what, for instance, is the story behind the memorial to a young woman shot in France in 1916? This project aims to record gravestones and memorials over 20 years old to a consistent standard, to map the grave-yards and to provide an online database of this

information, enabling research into genealogy and family history, as well as demographic surveys across time and place. The project will enable the biodiversity of churchyards to be explored and enhanced, helping to support parishes manage these open spaces better and encouraging more people from the community to get involved and hands-on with their heritage. A third strand is the opportunity to celebrate the County's Glorious Gothic heritage with arts projects based in various venues such as libraries and schools; from Byron, bats and buttresses, to gargoyles, grotesques and ghost stories. We also believe that by highlighting the risk to graveyards we may encourage better management and care both of the gravestones themselves and of the bio-diverse environment that surrounds them. Gravestones offer a largely untapped but vastly rich resource for social history, local history, language and writing, art, superstition, understand-

ing of Christian teaching. Online teaching resources developed will improve interpretation of graveyards and make them accessible to all. The project will also allow individuals, groups, community and local history societies to investigate their own heritage and to acquire skills and knowledge that will help them in future research. We will notify you of further developments, or you can check our website.



A number of local societies were represented. The objective was to demonstrate the digital resources that were available from the libraries and archives services. Tim Warner covered Our Nottinghamshire www.ournottinghamshire.org.uk, Nick Tomlinson demonstrated Picture the Past www.picturethepast.org.uk, Peter Lester talked about Nottinghamshire Archives Worldwide Catalogue. The focus throughout was on sites that could be searched for information, sources, references, contacts etc. The County also has access to some

There will be all kinds of Medieval merriment, plus stalls and entertainment. They are looking for people who could volunteer on the day as

- event stewards to help with the general running of the event
- strolling costumed characters (your choice be someone famous or a bog standard medieval person, and build up atmosphere by interacting in character with visitors)
- a town crier to announce events/stir up enthusiasm
- a fool or jester!

Travel expenses will be paid (the event is at Gregory Street, which has its own tram stop), and you can do as much or as little as you want - even an hour or so would really help. The event planners will ensure that you have time to enjoy the event yourself. They also need people to help in making basic costumes for the stewards and for a class of teeny tiny people from Dunkirk Primary who are getting involved (these will be very basic tabards or similar, worn over their own clothes). They can provide patterns, material and workspace if wanted. Other than the costume making these roles require little commitment other than on the day itself. There's a short meeting at 6pm on 9 September for people who are interested and want to find out more. This is being held at the Dunkirk and Lenton Partnership Forum, Church Square, Lenton, NG7 1SL (opposite the Crocus Cafe, behind the Lenton high rise flats and the Savoy Cinema). Just turn up!



Castle Ceremony Marks Great War Centenary

On Monday 4th August 2014 NLHA Chairman John Parker represented Nottinghamshire local history and heritage at a ceremony held at Nottingham Castle to commemorate the centenary of the outbreak of the Great War.

The ceremony began at 11am when the Vice Lord-Lieutenant and Lord Mayor arrived to join invited guests at Nottingham Castle Museum & Art Gallery. In a mark of respect at 12 noon the Union flag was ceremoniously raised and then lowered to half-mast followed by a minute's silence. There was then a series of short speeches and readings by the Lord Mayor, the Vice Lord-Lieutenant, Pauline Allan (Chairman of Nottinghamshire County Council) and John Cotterill (Lead Volunteer for Nottinghamshire's Trent to Trenches programme)

After the speeches, there was an opportunity for guests to visit the Trent to Trenches Exhibition, which opened on 26th July and runs until 16th November. The Exhibition explores the experiences of Nottinghamshire people, at home and in the trenches of Northern France, through powerful visual images and artefacts, many on loan from local people.

Nottinghamshire County Council chairman Pauline Allan said: "I am proud to represent the County Council on such a momentous day in British history. Nottinghamshire lost more than 13,000 men and women in the Great War and they are very much in our thoughts today. It is important that we commemorate such significant dates so that today's generation never forget that we have our freedom because of the sacrifices of so many."

Councillor Ian Malcolm, Lord Mayor of Nottingham said: "As a city and county we need to remember the great sacrifice that was made by Nottinghamshire people, both on the front line and also at home during the conflict. The conflict brought about huge social changes which have had a lasting impact on our local communities."

Last year, as a member of the now defunct Notts Historic Gardens Trust, I wrote in protest to Ashfield Council at the planning application put in to build various structures in the historic and ancient gardens at Teversal (Doomsday site, Victorian pleasure gardens created by Lord Carnavon, roman bath in the fields nearby...). Many others throughout the county, upset at the thought of losing even more of this valuable site, also protested, and the planning application was turned down. Now it has been appealed, and although, I gather, the local authorities agree that it would not be appropriate to build on the ancient and unrecorded site, they feel it necessary to hold a public meeting so that the planners can be convinced that the decision to turn down the application was the right one. I am trying everyone and everywhere I know to get help in attending this meeting and speaking out to convince the planners that there are those of us out here who value this site and feel that it must not be further destroyed without proper archaeological investigation and recording.
