Nottinghamshire's People Ancestral Stories from the Archives

Admission FREE

Friday 7 June - Sunday 1 September Open daily Weston Gallery, Lakeside, University Park, Nottingham

This exhibition celebrates the lives of Nottinghamshire's people and communities. It tells about very different experiences. George Africanus was a former slave who came to Nottingham and became its first black

entrepreneur. Robert Weatherall, by contrast, was a local boy from an agricultural family who went on to study at Christ's College, Cambridge.

Through church records, private papers, maps, wills and many other sources, it uncovers a rich world that lies beyond the indexes of census and birth, marriage and death records. Visitors can see the historic Guild Roll of St Mary, Nottingham, dated 1371, on view for the first time since its purchase in 2006. The roll identifies the men and women who joined the guild that provided help in times of



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sickness and unemployment. The exhibition has been jointly curated by staff from Nottinghamshire Archives and Manuscripts and Special Collections at The University of Nottingham.



Archaeology at Rufford Abbey The Community Archaeologists at Nottingham County Council are organising a volunteer dig at Rufford from 1 to the 12 July. The first week (1-5 July) will be run as a field school and will examine the foundations of an ornamental gateway at the north end of the Broad Drive, near to the mill. It is intended that the week will be "ideal for people who want to get a proper introduction to professional excavation techniques."

The second week (8-12 July) will see the excavation of a disused water channel and studying the former garden features in an attempt to understand their layout.

century, I recalled seeing a picture of two African men that was situated in the abbey's under croft. I had forgotten all about this image but since the University College London have released the Legacies of British Slaveownership records on their website, I was intrigued to see a link with the abbey come up in the form of Colonel Thomas Wildman under my Nottingham search. Wildman owned 241 enslaved workers on his Quebec Estate at St Mary in Jamaica. His compensation for giving up the slaves was £4588 15s 11d which in today's money equates to over £227,000. Wildman used some of his fortune to restore Newstead Abbey, today owned by Nottingham City Council and to rebuild The Hutt at Ravenshead. The African men from the Abbey's under croft were not slaves, they were James Chuma and Abdullah Susi, loyal servants of Dr David Livingstone who had accompanied the explorer throughout Africa and back home after his death. They had been personally invited by Queen Victoria to visit Livingstone's homeland and achieved a celebrity status when here, however they were still quartered with other servants during their 'tour' in 1874. They attended the Royal Geographical Society and received medals for their contribution to the African expedition. Chuma was released as a slave in childhood and Dr Livingstone became his only family, he later went on to become a leader for the Universities Mission to Central Africa (1879-80) and died eight years after Livingstone from tuberculosis. Abdullah Susi also became a leader for the UMCA (1883-1891) he was baptised in 1886 taking the name of David and died in 1891.

Having worked at Newstead Abbey in the early part of the twenty first

The British Slave Owner database shows those who claimed for financial compensation when Caribbean and other British Empire slavery was abolished in 1833. The website can be found at www.ucl.ac.uk/lbs. The database incorporates information from The National Archives' registers of the Office for the Registry of Colonial Slaves. Other Nottinghamshire people on the register were Robert Carrington, 2nd Baron Carrington from Dulcote Lodge in Nottinghamshire, who inherited his 268 enslaved workers in Jamaica from his father Abel Smith the Nottingham banker; Elizabeth Doncaster from Nottingham with 28 slaves in Trinidad and Susan Elizabeth Strafford with properties listed in Collingham and Retford with 3 slaves in Jamaica. No further information can be found regarding Elizabeth Doncaster; however Susan Elizabeth Strafford was the wife of Henry Thomas Strafford, a Music Master from South Collingham.
