Bromley House Library




Bromley House library may not be Britain's oldest surviving private subscription library, that honour probably belongs to Manchester's Portico library established in 1802, but 200 years is certainly a long time and deserves to be celebrated.

On the 2nd April 1816 at a general meeting at Thurland Hall, the home of Dr John Storer (the first physician at the General Hospital and the Library's first President) the library started and has operated continuously since then, first in Carlton Street and from 1822 in Bromley House.

2016 will be a year of celebration. There will be a very ambitious programme of talks, events and gallery exhibitions throughout the year so that as many people as possible can join in the celebrations. 

Farnsfield to Rainworth: The Journey of a Lifetime.

The life and times of local boy turned explorer by Philip Marsh

Augustus C. Gregory was the most distinguished of three exploring brothers. Born in Farnsfield, he was the second son of a retired army officer and joined the Western Australia Survey Department in 1841.

In 1846, with his brothers Francis and Henry, he explored the area to the north of Perth, discovered and named Lake Moore and found coal in the River Irwin. Two years later, while examining the pastoral potential of the country inland from Shark Bay, he discovered lead in the Murchison River.

On his expedition of !855-6 through Queensland and Northern Territory, he discovered and named Sturt's Creek which he traced for 300 miles.

In March 1858, he led an expedition to search for Ludwig Leichardt's party which had disappeared without trace in 1848. The party set out from Euroomba Station on the Dawson Ranges. After travelling for four weeks he found the letter 'L' cut into a tree and thus encouraged, he followed the Barcoo River to its junction with the Thomson River, and then proceeded along Cooper's and Stzelecki Creeks as far as Lake Blanche. He arrived in Adelaide without finding the missing expedition.

The information recorded by Gregory on this journey was, however, of great value. Gregory demonstrated that many rivers drained into Lake Eyre and thus solved the puzzle of Australia's inland drainage. It also revived South Australia's interest in the country north of Lake Torrens.

Gregory became Surveyor-General of the newly established state of Queensland in 1859, serving in several official postions until his death in Brisbane in 1905. He was knighted in 1903 for his contribution to Australian exploration



Bulwell > Bestwood (including the Winding Wheel) 24th April 2016 tbc



400th Anniversary of the Death of Richard Clyfton

Richard Clyfton, the Separatist minister of Babworth who then led the Scrooby group on their migration to Holland, died 400 years ago this May. This is an anniversary of some significance in Nottinghamshire. The local heritage group Pilgrims & Prophets will be organising a commemorative excursion on May 14th. This will include 'pick ups' in Worksop and Retford, and then visits to places associated with Clyfton including the fascinating country churches at Marnham, Babworth and Scrooby. There will be a Congregationalist minister 'on board' to maintain 400 years of tradition, as Clyfton effectively founded this denomination.

Barney Drake's Grandmother

Barney Drake is starting to research the life story of his grandmother, born Dorothy Doncaster in West Burton, Notts in 1883. She was brought up on a farm at West Burton until her father's sudden death in 1894. The 1901 census shows that she had crossed the county boundary with her widowed mother to Gainsborough in Lincolnshire, where she is recorded with the occupation of Candidate Pupil Teacher. By 1911 she was working as a governess for a Yorkshire family.

Can anyone help with the following questions?:

1) What is the most likely training place for a Notts farmer's daughter to have studied to become a teacher?

2) Is there any resource that lists teacher training establishments for women in Notts and Lincs for the late 19th and early 20th centuries, or would she just have learned by osmosis at town/village schools?
