Richard Gaunt Nominated to be an Elected Director of INSPIRE

INSPIRE is the newly created organisation set up to run the Nottinghamshire County Library Service and Nottinghamshire Archives. The organisation will be run by a Board of Directors and four of these directors will be directly elected by INSPIRE members. Elections will be held between Monday 15th August and Monday 19th September with the results announced on Monday 26th September.

Former NLHA Executive Committee Member Richard Gaunt is standing in the elections to the INSPIRE board. His manifesto (reproduced below) is based upon promoting the interests of the county's historians and archaeologists and the wide range of archives and library service users.

'The next three years will be crucial in establishing INSPIRE as a Community Benefit Society committed to working for the interests of its members. I can offer the requisite experience, enthusiasm and interest in helping INSPIRE to become a genuinely connected, representative members' organisation. I was one of the committee of volunteers which helped to establish the Friends of Nottinghamshire Archives (FONA) in 2012 and have served as its elected Chairman since that time. I believe that its success as a representative body working in partnership with the archives service offers a model which can usefully inform the work of INSPIRE. I am committed to representing the views of all members of INSPIRE, whatever their background and interests. Working together, I believe that we can help to realise the many opportunities created by the new organisation and strengthen the existing and future level of provision. I am particularly interested in INSPIRE's commitment to education. There are a significant number of post-16s in Nottinghamshire who use the county's library service and, as a University academic, I am committed to enabling students to use all the facilities available. My ongoing interest in these issues is demonstrated by my service on the Nottinghamshire Archives Users Group and continuing connection with the Nottinghamshire Local History Association. I am also an elected board member of the Nottingham Civic Society and the Thoroton Society of Nottinghamshire which will enable me to strengthen INSPIRE's connections with the county's thriving community of local historians and archaeologists.'









Ten Drawings from the Royal Collection

Between 30 July and 9 October

Nottingham Castle is to display ten of the finest drawings by Leonardo da Vinci from the Royal Collection in a new exhibition.

The works have been selected to show the extraordinary scope of the artist's interests, from painting and sculpture to engineering, zoology, botany, mapmaking and anatomy, as well as his use of different media – pen and ink, red and black chalks, watercolour and metalpoint. Through drawing, Leonardo attempted to record and understand the world around him. He maintained that an image transmitted knowledge more accurately and concisely than any words. Nonetheless, many of his drawings are extensively annotated, including the sheet of Studies for casting the equestrian monument to Francesco Sforza, c.1492–4, and the double-sided page from a notebook of anatomical studies, *The heart compared to a seed* and *The vessels of the liver*, *spleen and kidneys*, c.1508.

Leonardo was left-handed and throughout his life he wrote in perfect mirror-image, from right to left. Rather than an attempt to keep his investigations secret, as has been claimed, this was probably a childhood trick that he never abandoned.


Robin Hood Festival 2016

Despite the bad weather the day got off to a good start with short presentations in the Lakeside theatre Introduced and Chaired by **Dr David Knight**, Director of Research at Trent & Peak


the changes and developments in local history; **Ruth Imeson**, of Nottinghamshire Archives, gave an illustrated talk about archives and heritage.

These vary from the tale of a teenage boy, who drove a butcher's delivery van in wartime to a seven year old, off to school on her own in thick snow, with no chance of cancelled lessons or crossing wardens! 

Mary Ward College of Education, Keyworth by Howard Fisher

Howard's new book tells the story of the teacher training establishment, founded and operated by the Loreto Sisters, on Nicker Hill in Keyworth (now the site of the British Geological Society). Built in 1968 and opened by Princess Anne in June 1970 it was closed in 1977 due to changes in Government education policy.

The restoration of the Memorial Gates to the Rectory Field at Keyworth was made possible by a donation from the Sisters of Loreto to commemorate their stay in Keyworth between 1968 and 1977.


Francis Willughby: His life and legacy, University of Nottingham
