Northamptonshire Record Office Charges for Access to Historic Records

From 21 August 2017 Northamptonshire Record Office will charge for access to historic records. Essentially, the only free access will now be Tues-Thurs 0900-1300, and all other access will be charged at £31.50 per hour.

This is an issue that has implications beyond Northamptonshire and its collections and also raises legal concerns about documents in public ownership that the record office are obliged to make available. *Local Historians across the region need to protest about this*. 






Lido to Lakeside 1924 to 1992

A History of Nottingham Trams, Angel Row History Forum August 2017

On Tuesday 8th August 2017 at 10:00am in the Local Studies Library on the first floor of Nottingham Central Library there will be a presentation on the background, development, expansion and subsequent decline of Nottingham's (and surrounding areas) first electric tram system. It will be accompanied by a viewing of *The Ripley Rattlers* on video and extracts from letters, news reports and literature of the time.

In 1881 Nottingham had a population of 186700 but this grew rapidly and by 1901 stood at 239752. Considerable development was taking place across the city including such places as New Basford and Hyson Green; Sherwood and Carrington also grew dramatically. The Corporation planned and built new roads but, other than a failed attempt in The Meadows, there was no establishment of separate housing and industrial zones resulting in the lace and hosiery factories being scattered across the town. It was only towards the end of the nineteenth century that specific industrial areas emerged and as these pockets developed the need for public transport became acute.

Commuting was available to the middle classes by way of horse buses and horse trams and by 1870 regular services were running to Basford, Lenton, Carrington, Sneinton and West Bridgford. In 1875 the Nottingham and District Tramways Company was founded and by 1878 ran regular horse trams from St Peters Square to the Midland Station and the Great Northern Station on London Road. In 1879 they introduced new routes to Carrington and in 1881 to Basford. However in 1890 the local traders association was complaining to the Corporation about the tram service on the basis that it was slow and expensive. The corporation apparently took no notice.

In 1897 the tramways were taken out of private ownership by the corporation who exercised their rights under the 1870 Tramways Act and plans were put in place for an expanded system using electric overhead traction.

On 01 January 1901 the first electric tram ran from the market place in Nottingham to Sherwood and the service was 'extensively patronised'. The tram fleet increased from 135 in 1914 to 155 by 1919 and by 1926 200 trams were operating on almost 26 miles of track but from 1921 there was increased competition from motor buses and from 1927 by trolley busses. The Nottingham Corporation Act of 1930 lead to the conversion of tramway routes to trolley bus services and electric trams were phased out by 1936.





Charlie Peace – His Amazing Life and Astounding Legend charts the evolution of a Victorian master burglar and murderer from truth to myth. The book begins with the way his crimes were reported in The Illustrated Police News before examining the growth of the legend in Penny Dreadfuls and ballads, before this criminal was uniquely transformed into a folk hero in popular theatre, waxwork shows, early cinema, music hall song and even comics.

The book will appeal to anyone interested in True Crime, 19th century literature, theatre and film history and popular culture. It contains kaleidoscopic extracts from rare and neglected sources and is heavily illustrated throughout.

Michael Eaton is a Nottingham-born playwright and scriptwriter. He is best known for his television docudrama scripts, including Shipman, Why Lockerbie and Shoot to Kill, and for writing the feature film Fellow Traveller (1989), which won best screenplay in the British Film Awards.
