There are opportunities for talks to be included in the autumn edition of the *Nottinghamshire Historian*, while speakers and presenters who are interested in publishing their work might like to hear about the small grants available from the NLHA.

Small fees will also be offered to those giving talks.

We welcome groups of all sizes, involved in projects big at small, and at all stages of their research. We're especially keen to involve newer groups, those whose work is still underway, and people who have not shared their research before, who might like to bring a display or to give shorter talk or a work in progress update.

7Wonder is trying to speak to as many people as possible who may have a story to tell or an interesting object to show from the last 70 years, for example, perhaps you might know of someone who migrated here to work in the NHS in the mid 20th century and has a fascinating story to tell? Or maybe you know of someone who was affected by the Stafford Hospital scandal? Or perhaps you know someone who still has a set of spectacles that were available for free on the NHS before payment was introduced in 1952?



Nottingham Women's History Group is commemorating and celebrating Vote 100 in Nottingham because it is about women and the ongoing debate about their rights and status in society. Whilst it is recognised that the Representation of the People Act in 1918 was only a partial victory, as the vote was only granted to women over the age of 30. It was an important watershed and led eventually to all women gaining the same rights as men to vote in 1928. The vote was only won after a long and determined campaign for suffrage and Nottingham and Nottinghamshire women were key to this. New campaigns and feminist demands emerged after the end of WW1.

These included the right for equal pay, the improvement of working conditions, decent housing and childcare, a list which continues to resonate with women today.

Nottingham Vote 100 Seminar, Nottingham Women's History Group

On Saturday the 10th of February 2018 – 2.00pm to 5.00pm at the International Community Centre, 61b Mansfield Road, Nottingham NG1 5FN Krista Cowman will discuss: **What was militant about the British women's suffrage campaign?**

British women fought for the vote over a long period of time. By the middle of the nineteenth century, individual demands for the vote had coalesced into a national suffrage movement with branches and meetings throughout the country. But it was not until the arrival of militancy in the early part of the last century that the British campaign came to dominate the newspapers at home and abroad.

In this centenary year, this talk will explore what was distinctive about the militant movement that emerged in Britain, and question how important militancy was in achieving votes for women. Krista Cowman is Professor of History at the University of Lincoln. She has published and broadcast widely on the British suffrage movement, including Women of the Right Spirit (2007) the first book-length study of the many forgotten women who worked as full-time organisers for the militant Women's Social and Political Union. She recently worked as historical advisor for the feature film Suffragette (dir. Sarah Gavron, 2015).

The Newly Built Personality of Ralph, Lord Cromwell, James Wright, Department of History

On Saturday 10 February starting at 10:00am and finishing approximately at 12:30pm at Lenton Grove at the University of Nottingham James Wright will talk about Ralph, Lord Cromwell. Rising from a Lincolnshire family of limited political influence, Ralph Cromwell became one of the most significant figures of the mid-fifteenth century. Linking structure to biography, the personality of a man on the rise from Lord of the Manor to Lord Treasurer of England is reflected in the power statements of his castles, great houses and ecclesiastical buildings. This can be contrasted with glimpses of the vulnerabilities and status anxieties bound up in his social identity with emphatic, yet revealing architectural statements revolving around his motto, heraldry, livery badges and repeated architectural devices. Those structures which he commissioned then went on to have an extraordinarily powerful legacy which lasted for over 150 years of English architecture.
