The national Portable Antiquities Scheme (PAS) records archaeological objects found by the public in England and Wales. This year it celebrates its 15th anniversary with more than 13,000 finds from Nottinghamshire recorded on the PAS online database, including coins, tools, weapons and jewellery. It is an important source of information for researchers and for everyone with an interest in history, archaeology and heritage.

This exhibition will highlight some of the finds from the county and examine the important contribution they have made to our wider understanding of Nottinghamshire.

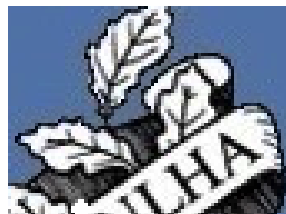

Description:

The research project examines the experiences of smokers and non-smokers in public spaces during the 1980s. The 1980s witnessed a growth of medical evidence that confirmed the hazards of second-hand smoke and thus in need of spatial regulation. workplace, public transport and the restaurant became center-stages for the push against smoking and how social relationships had to be re-negotiated as part of this process.

The project involves a 60-minute face-to-face, audio-recorded interview with smokers and non-smokers born in 1962 or earlier, in which the participants will be asked to reflect on their experiences of (encountering) smoking in public spaces such as the workplace, restaurant or on public transport.

Participation is voluntary.

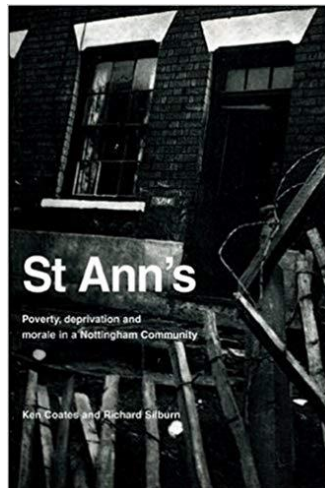
The study is anonymous and the data gathered will be stored securely.

Bill Silburn was the Senior Lecturer in Social Policy at the University of Nottingham, and taught in the same department at the University for 53 years. Early in his career and for many years thereafter he worked closely with the late Ken Coates, and their Pelican Special 'Poverty; the Forgotten Englishmen', first published in 1970, made an important contribution to the so-called 'rediscovery of poverty' at that time. With a small group of colleagues, he helped to found the journal Benefits, now known as the Journal of Poverty and Social Justice and was for 25 years the Chair of its Editorial Board. Now retired, he is a trustee of Advice Nottingham, a consortium of Nottingham-based advice agencies."

ANGEL ROW HISTORY FORUM

The History of the Robin Hood Line, Dave Amos

Join us on Tuesday 6th November 2018 10.00 to 12.00 at 1st Floor Central Library, Angel Row, Nottingham for a talk on The History of the Robin Hood Line with David Amos.

Following tea/coffee from 10.00 the talk will start at 10.30.

The original Leen Valley line was opened as far as Kirkby-in-Ashfield on 2 October 1848 where it joined with the Mansfield & Pinxton Railway and services from Mansfield to Nottingham. The line was owned by the London, Midland and Scottish Railway (LMS) from 1923-1947 and in 1948 became part of the nationalised British Railways (BR). The final closure of all of the stations on the line in October 1964 left Mansfield without a rail link. The line between Nottingham and Newstead re-opened in 1993 and to Mansfield Woodhouse on 20th November 1995 with the final extension to Worksop opening in 1998.



In March 2016 it was reported that 'high-level' talks had begun on extending the Robin Hood rail line across north Nottinghamshire to Ollerton. Nottinghamshire County Council wanted to expand the route and met Government representatives on Monday. Besides the six mile-plus extension from Warsop to Ollerton, the plan would involve re-opening existing stations in Warsop, and Edwinstowe and building a new station in Ollerton.

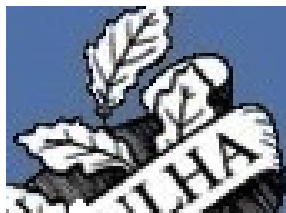
We have provisionally agreed dates, topics and speakers with our colleagues in Nottingham Local Studies Library for History Forum meetings for 2019:

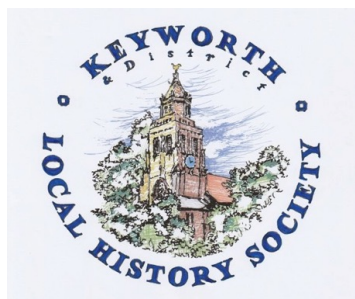

Votes for Women, Val Wood and Miriam Jack- son, Framework Knitters Museum

Val Wood and Miriam Jackson of Nottingham Women's History Group are coming to the Framework Knitters Museum in Ruddington on Thursday 18 October at 2.30pm to present their talk "WOMEN'S STRUGGLE FOR THE VOTE IN NOTTINGHAMSHIRE".

This year marks the centenary of the first British general election in which women (but not all women) were allowed to vote. The women's suffrage movement beginning in the 1860's and ending in 1928 culminated in women at last gaining full enfranchisement.

The campaign was passionately fought in Nottinghamshire. Leading figures including Emmeline Pankhurst and Millicent Fawcett were regular speakers at meetings held at the Forest Recreation Ground between 1907 and 1914 which attracted crowds of up to four thousand.
