Peter Gaw, Inspire Chief Executive, update on reopening plans



We closed our libraries and halted our learning and

cultural programme on 20 March, and as I step back into libraries as we prepare to reopen it is very strange, but it's great to be back in our buildings and look forward. These have been unprecedented and strange times and not something my colleagues or I trained for which makes the efforts of my colleagues extraordinary, so I wanted to update you and tell you our plans for the future. Our staff have continued to work, looking after our buildings during closure, developing a digital offer for culture, learning and libraries and are now preparing to reopen libraries, albeit in a limited and safe way.

We can't wait to welcome all our customers back into our buildings and in the future our partners too, who will continue to inspire the people of Nottinghamshire. The majority of our libraries will start to reopen from 6 July with a limited service and measures in place which are essential to help us operate safely in this new environment. Customers will be able to browse and borrow books and other items, take advantage of a new click and collect service and access IT services, however at this time we will not be able to provide social and study spaces or run events and activities.

We will continue to offer a virtual programme which has developed with fantastic arts and cultural resources, virtual exhibitions and performances and learning courses. Our Education Library Service is also back up and running and

can fulfil project requests for you.

Nottinghamshire Archives will also be welcoming back visitors by appointment only as well as offering a number of remote services. Our music service, 16-24 study programme and youth arts team are continuing to work with young people mainly through a great virtual offer developed since March.

As our opening times and service offer is very likely to change over the coming months we will ensure our website is up to date, so do check online www.inspireculture.org.uk or contact Ask Inspire.

Our priority is the safety of our staff and customers and we will open in line with government guidance and best practise in our sector. We have limited our capacity, reorganised our library spaces, have quarantine arrangements for books and improved our cleaning practises to name but a few measures. One thing that will not change is the warmth of our welcome and we really do look forward to seeing you and inspiring you.

Bob has also reformatted a long list of online resources for history and archaeology prepared by Cynthia Brown and Matthew Morris of the Leicestershire Archaeological and Historical Society. A very varied list of options to keep you informed and amused!

Until meetings resume Bob plans to upload about three new tasty morsels to the WHO web site about every fortnight. These will include: a recently discovered Roman cooking vessel (or at least a significant part) in what may be a Roman ditch two lists of the wealthier inhabitants of Wymeswold in the early seventeenth century revelations that the notorious Leader of the Levellers in the mid-seventeenth century may have owned property in Burton-on-the-Wolds information about Prestwold church's bells a photograph of one of the first buses to run via Wymeswold.

If you have any other snippets of information you would like to share with WHO members then please let Bob know. Especially if it is about somewhere in or near the Wolds which isn't Wymeswold!

Finally, another book from the WHO is scheduled to appear in September. More details nearer the time



NLHF have expanded their £50million Heritage Emergency Fund criteria to help heritage organisations safely reopen in line with Government guidelines.

Are you eligible to apply?

Costs associated with safely re-opening in line with Government guidelines

This could include:

- additional staff to help manage queues or additional cleaning
- Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) for staff and volunteers
- implementing contactless payment methods
- erecting temporary structures to help manage visitors such as shelter for queues or additional toilets

Please be aware that Government guidelines on how and when to reopen may vary across the UK.

The Mills Archive Trust



The Mills Archive Trust was established in 2002. A grant of £50,000 from the Heritage Lottery Fund enabled the Archive to launch its internet catalogue in 2003. Other early supporters of the trust included the Society for the Protection of Ancient Buildings (SPAB), and the Hampshire Mills Group, which donated £200.

The Archive was set up in response to an expressed need to preserve and where possible integrate the various threatened sources of information on the windmills and watermills of the UK and the rest of the world. It was hoped to prevent material being lost on the death of a molinologist by creating a suitable repository.

Can you help?

Sugar production is one of a number of industries that exploited slavery and we feel that the experiences and contribution of all people who have been involved in milling, need to be preserved and shared. The same is true of other marginalised groups in many industries. All voices from the past should be heard, if we are to ensure the historical record is complete and properly documented. This is a big issue for heritage generally and for the narratives that society decides to tell.

Here at the Mills Archive Trust, we have a responsibility to address any gaps in our coverage. To date, much of our material focuses on the technology rather than the story of the people involved and we are seeking to address that with your help.

We are looking at any gaps in our information and seeking any opportunities to attract, gather and share a wide range of accounts and perspectives on the history of milling. These narratives are brought to life through the stories of the people involved.

We therefore encourage you to get in touch.

Do you – or someone you know – have information, memories, research, or publications that would contribute to our efforts to document the multi-faceted history of milling?

Do you have suggestions of any organisations we could get in touch with? Areas include the roles and experiences of a range of people – locally and globally - such as slaves, women, children involved in child labour, and the working classes.

Thank you in advance for any assistance or insight you can provide. With your help, we will be able to ensure that the history of milling – with its many stories and lived experiences – will be preserved for current and future generations to learn from and understand. We appreciate your support and contributions.


