Tollerton Hall has been successively added to over many years with Gothic revival additions. It seems to have attracted some trouble in the staff - in 1878 the gardener (who was also the parish clerk) was sent to prison for twenty years for attempting to poison his wife. A few years later the butler was convicted of attempting to rape the 68 year old housekeeper in the middle of the night. It was a house up until 1928, when attempts to sell it at first failed to meet the guide price; then became a sort of 'country club' with a sports club and hotel for 'hunting people'. The opening of this was attended by Sir Harold Bowden and Sir Albert Ball (who seems to have bought it and sold it on to them) who talked about it having an air taxi service but this plan for an American-style luxury activity centre never flourished. From 1930 part at least was in use as the Paton Congregational College, for which some outbuildings were converted into a chapel. It was then inevitably requisitioned for Government use during WW2. American soldiers were housed here, then prisoners of war.

From 1946 to 1986 it belonged to the Roman Catholic diocese of Nottingham and was used as a boys' school.

Ethel Webb's Japanese Garden

An exhibition at Newstead Abbey, Nottinghamshire, until 31st August 2022

The Japanese Garden at Newstead Abbey, Nottinghamshire, which visitors enjoy today was created under the direction of Ethel Webb (reputedly 'one of the best amateur gardeners in England'), between 1899 and 1914. This exhibition is inspired by Ethel's Japanese Garden and celebrates the cross-cultural exchange between Britain and Japan during this period.

It features a series of botanical illustrations loaned from the collections of the Royal Botanic Gardens, Kew, alongside historical material and objects from the collections of Nottingham City Museums, which includes Samurai armour, vases, painted screens, woodcuts, bronzes and even a temple bell! As well as exploring Ethel's garden the Exhibition looks at some of the Japanese plants that have become a permanent feature of British gardens. The illustrations by leading British botanical artists include works by Lillian Snelling (said to be the most important British botanical artist of the first half of the 20th century), Stella Ross-Craig, Ann V. Webster and Walter Hood Fitch.

In connection with the Japanese Exhibition, the Midland Region of The Japanese Garden Society is organising a Japanese Garden Day at Newstead Abbey on Sunday 10th July. The day will include talks about Japanese gardens in the UK in general and the history of the garden at Newstead Abbey in particular. There will also be a guided tour of the Japanese Garden. 
