NEWSLETTER October 2025



A rather gloomy picture to start October, showing the Sacheverall tomb at Ratcliffe (or Radcliffe) on Soar in the SW corner of Nottinghamshire. In fact the church contains the monuments to the family over four generations, all made of finest local alabaster. Later generations had some interesting connections through marriage top key Nottinghamshire families – the Hutchinsons, Iretons and Babingtons to name just three of them.

Henry Sacheverall died in 1625 without a male heir, despite having had three wives. He bequeathed the manor to the Hutchinsons. Their descendants though included the Sitwells. One of these was Sir Sacheverell Sitwell (1897-1988), the brother of Edith and Osbert. Both of his children had 'Sacheverall' (with an e) as either their first or middle names.

The revival in this family of the 'Sacheverall' name may be because Sir Sacheverall's father, Sir George of Renishaw, had antiquarian interests. The Dean of Wells, who died in 1881, was another man with this unusual Christian name. Before that the name attracted some ignominy when Henry

Sacheverall in 1709 preached a sermon that sparked days of rioting against dissenters in London. Another branch of the family settled in Ireland.

<u>David Speed</u> is an expert on the Pentrich revolt of 1817, when a large mob marched towards Nottingham from Pentrich, Derbyshire, with the ultimate intention of going to London to topple the government. In this talk he will explore the role of Henry Sampson, an alleged government spy and agent provocateur, who betrayed Jeremiah Brandreth, the leader of the revolt.

Richard Pincott has been the survey director of The Field Detectives since 1999 and has overseen historic landscape investigations that have taken the team from before the Iron Age right through to World War II and beyond. Enjoy a whistle-stop visual tour showcasing the development of a Historic Landscape Investigation Team. 25 Years in 45 Minutes! One of Richard's passions is delving into the mysteries hidden away in the Nottingham night soil!

<u>Andy McKinnon</u> is a retired teacher and currently the Chairman of Arnold Local History Group. This talk maps the development of a model village in the Nottinghamshire coalfield,

after rich coal seams were proved to exist deep below the area soon after the end of the Great War.

<u>Meghan King</u> is the Finds Liaison Officer for Nottinghamshire and Derbyshire. Having worked for the Portable Antiquities Scheme for six years, she is actively engaged in increasing public awareness and volunteer involvement with the scheme in the two counties. She will introduce the scheme and the Treasure process and give an overview of interesting local finds. She will also bring a handling collection, so that attendees can handle typical objects recorded by the scheme.





The Rise and Demise of the Institute for Workers' Control 1964–1985



A talk by Alan Tuckman

The Institute for Workers' Control (IWC) bridged industrial relations and politics in Britain during the 1960s and 1970s. Formally founded in 1968, largely at the initiative of Ken Coates and Tony Topham, the IWC brought together a diverse group, including trade-unionists, academics, and political activists. Initially assembled in 1964 to unpack the slogan 'nationalisation under workers' control' in anticipation of a radical Labour Government, it increasingly became a forum for the growing shop stewards' movement, formulating and honing 'alternative' plans for industry and the economy. It helped develop 'new forms of industrial action' used to challenge industrial rationalization and redundancies.

Historic England funds restoration of Newark Parish Church and Worksop Priory Gatehouse

Two important medieval buildings in Nottinghamshire have had funding awarded from Historic England's Heritage at Risk Capital Fund:

- The 14th century **Worksop Priory Gatehouse** had been given a £178,147 grant for interior repairs and restoration with the intention that 'the building will house rooms for hire and a creative flexible space for a variety of different community activities and exhibitions.'
- The magnificent 14th century **church of St Mary Magdalene**, **Newark**, has been awarded a grant of £151,163 to fund the final phase of urgent masonry repairs to the building (part of a larger National Lottery Heritage Fund project, which aims to improve access, facilities, the condition of the building and energy efficiency)

Graham is the chairman of Nottingham Civic Society. He has been photographing Nottingham's buildings and architecture since the late 1970s and has over 10,000 images of the city. He has written a range of historical articles about Nottingham's railways, canals, police stations etc, and published three pictorial-guide books about Wollaton and one on the Nottingham Canal. He presents around 15 talks a year on a range of subjects, Nottingham related – the list is available on his website at www.gwoodward.co.uk/talks.html – and he is a guide on a series of walks for the Civic Society.

The talk is about Nottingham's cinemas and looks at the early development of moving pictures, how and why cinemas came into being and their development in Nottingham, which has had 57 cinemas over the last 120 years. The talk looks at the most popular ones, their architecture, and their significance both locally and nationally. It also includes some film of Nottingham shot in 1902. Regrettably, it is bring your own popcorn or choc ices!

Maurice Barley Lecture: 'Nottinghamshire timber-framed buildings'

Jason Mordan, Conservation, Nottinghamshire County Council

Timber Frame Buildings of Nottinghamshire is a passion that Jason learned from Graham Beaumont, his mentor, and has attempted to summarise in the short book(let) of the same title.

Nottinghamshire was at the forefront of dendrochronological investigations of oak-framed historic buildings, one of the first laboratories focused on 'tree-ring dating' began at the University of Nottingham. Early successful dates help unlock and, in some cases, rewrite our interpretation of oak-frame crafts and vernacular architecture.

This short talk is an introduction to some of these dated (and occasionally undated) timber-frame buildings.

Saturday 8 February 2025

Norah Witham Lecture: 'Nottinghamshire surveyed: mapping and documenting estates in the county before 1700'
Steph Mastoris, retired museum collections specialist

In the century and a half before 1700, a surprisingly large amount of land throughout Nottinghamshire was documented by the rising profession of estate surveyors. This work created not only detailed texts describing these estates, but also a fascinating body of manuscript maps. In this lecture, Steph Mastoris will discuss some of the reasons why these surveys were commissioned as well and illustrating the range of their cartography. This research is leading to a forthcoming volume in our Record Series.

Steph has recently stepped down from working at Amgueddfa Cymru - the National Museum of Wales. He started his career in museums here in Nottingham 46 years ago, and ever since has been researching the history and topography of the county. Steph has written a number of articles for the *Transactions*, as well as editing two volumes for the Record Series.

Why did they all come from here? Why the Mayflower Pilgrims and the linked group who formed the first Baptists originated in the region of North Notts and West Lincs.

Religious Liberty: A Gift to the World from Notts and Lincs: ideas about religious liberty now enshrined in the UN declaration of Human Rights can be traced back through the US 'First Amendment' to the thinking and writing of men who came from Nottinghamshire.

Thomas Helwys: The Price of Freedom: Helwys, a Nottingham man, financed the move of the 'Pilgrims' to Holland and there became a Baptist. He risked his own life by returning to England and founding the Baptist denomination, where he wrote the first text in English that argued for religious liberty for all faiths – for which he was imprisoned.

The Top Ten Scandals of Sherwood Forest: this is an unconventional approach to telling the story of Sherwood and the Dukeries. Rather than following it chronologically, we examine the tale through

ten scandals – money, sex and political – that define what happened to Sherwood and the great houses that were built there.

NEW: Romance and Disaster – Marriage Disasters of the Sherwood Aristocracy: focusing mainly on the period after 1800, this looks at some of the disastrous marriages made by lords, dukes and earls who formed the supposed elite of Dukeries society. No wonder several of them went bankrupt or needed rich Americans to bail them out....

NEW: From Nottinghamshire to the World

Some amazing stories of men and women from Nottinghamshire who travelled the globe to spread their faith, encountering many enthralling adventures. Fiji, Papua New Guinea, unexplored areas of Africa...and we also hear about the famous Dr Livingstone and why he came to Newstead. Covers aspects of the county's history often overlooked here – but celebrated in far-off corners of the Globe!

Worksop, Witches and a Place in American History: the Life of Richard Bernard: Richard Bernard was born in Tudor Epworth and became a great figure amongst the puritans and separatists under James I based mainly at Gainsborough and Worksop. Later he became a great writer, influenced John Bunyan and his daughter helped found a state in America. Today he is best-known for his authoritative guide on witches, based on his experience in Worksop!

Rebels and Radicals: the turbulent early Quakers from Notts: the Quakers were the most radical religious group of their day, challenging law and order wherever they went. They began in Mansfield with George Fox, their first meeting place was probably in Skegby, and their first 'martyr' was James Parnell of Retford. They travelled the world, courting controversy wherever they went and often they went to prison and suffered beatings.

Historical Highlights from Bassetlaw: the Bassetlaw region of North Notts is little known, yet it is an area with an amazing history full of battles, bravery, scandal and...some beautiful places. This is a personal selection of the most interesting places in the area and what they can tell us about its history.

Historical Highlights from Newark and Sherwood: this is a personal selection of the most interesting historical sites in Newark and Sherwood District – lost medieval fragments, forgotten villages, vanished castles, the forgotten world of the medieval fishpond and much more! Lots of pictures and ideas for doing some exploring of your own.

The Capricious Trent – the Battle between People and the River Trent: the course of the lower River Trent from Farndon and Averham to Gainsborough and beyond has seen some remarkable events in English history as people have struggled to keep it under control. This talk introduces you to the lost

channels, great floods and little village ferries that illustrate the course of this most intriguing of England's rivers.

Myths and Legends of the 'Mayflower' Story: the 'Mayflower' story is one that has 'grown in the telling' with many false claims and even monuments in the wrong place. This entertaining talk examines some of the 'red herrings' of the story including some shameless profiteering and examples of deliberate distortion of the truth.

Dangerous Women of Nottinghamshire: this talk compares two generations of Nottinghamshire women who fought against 'the system'. The first generational example is of the puritan women who supported their husbands to take on the Monarchy and to then survive amidst the wilds of New England. The comparison is made with radical, working-class preaching women in Nottingham in the early 1800s – who featured at one of the best-known public executions and then inspired the novelist George Eliot, until they were put back into their place by repressive men!

Some Nottinghamshire Artists: enjoy some paintings of the county and hear the stories of local artists who enjoyed success or failure along the way. Some you will have heard of, some are now pretty obscure, but all are interesting in their own ways.

'A thread in the web of time: the archaeology of the 18th century cotton mills at Papplewick' Over the last 20 years archaeological exploration has provided evidence about how the cotton mills in the Leen Valley were supplied with water, and how the system was modified to account for changing circumstances. The talk reports and discusses the progress of the work.

'A London Boy at Mr Robinson's mill' The story of the child workers who were brought from workhouses to work in these early factories.

'Spinning yarns: the history and operation of the cotton mills at Papplewick' A talk focussing on the history and operation of the spinning mills in the period 1778 – 1828. This was the first site in the World to use a steam engine to provide rotary motion in a textile factory.

'From bluebells to blue-tits: the natural habitats of Moor Pond Woods' A review of the varied habitats of this Nottinghamshire local nature reserve and discussion about how it is managed and maintained.

'From Marylebone to Massachusetts: the life and times of Henry Leonard' Recounting the story of a Nottinghamshire textile worker from his recruitment in the 1790s, through his employment to his eventual emigration in the 1850s.

'Bulwell, 1750-1880: Industrialisation and urbanisation in the Leen valley' Exploring the evidence for the development of a Nottingham suburb.

'Moving On: Investigating the migration of mill workers to Darley Abbey' Darley Abbey was a planned industrial hamlet built on a green-field site at the end of the 18th century. This talk looks at the evidence from censuses and parish registers to explore the migration of early factory workers.

'The history and heritage of Gedling Borough' Gedling Borough is one of the administrative districts of Nottinghamshire. This talk explores the history and development of the various places that make up the district.
