The American photographer Thomas Warren Sears (1880-1966) spent some time in Nottinghamshire in about 1906-8 and left a collection of photographs. He was a member of the American Society of Landscape Architects. No doubt this explains why several of his pictures relate to Welbeck, Thoresby etc.

The picture is of Edwinstowe High Street and shows a cart belonging to Sleaford and Son of the Sherwood Bakery in Edwinstowe. The Sleafords seem to have been influential Wesleyans in Edwinstowe with J E Sleaford as its school superintendent and Mrs Sleaford training them to sing.

Sears took hundreds of photos including in France and Scotland, and many of them have not been identified. For example, here is one that is 'somewhere in England':



Could this be in Nottinghamshire too?

Gill Sarre: Thieves, Poachers & more than the occasional Drunk!

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How law and order was administered in 19th century Farnsfield. Rural crime and punishment, the 'career' parish constable and a glimpse into the lives of a cast of colourful characters who found themselves on the wrong side of the law.

I have worked in, or for, the NHS for the whole of my career, as a Speech & Language Therapist in Nottingham, then as Research Manager and Facilitator in Primary Care organisations in the East Midlands. A lifelong love of history has led to a new direction in retirement, researching the history of Farnsfield and its inhabitants, primarily in the 18th and 19th centuries. I am also secretary of the Farnsfield Local History Society.

Michael Kirkby: Sir John Borlase Warren and his expedition to Quiberon Bay in 1795

Join Michael to learn about local Admiral, Sir John Borlase Warren, and his expedition to Quiberon Bay in 1795 where he led a daring and high-risk expedition that intended to end the Republican takeover of France and restore the French monarch to the throne.

Michael Kirkby is a local military historian who specialises in Warfare and the British Army in the 18th and 19th centuries. His key areas of interest are The War of the Spanish Succession, The Napoleonic Wars, Campaigns of the Victorian Army and The Anglo-Zulu War. Whatever the era, Michael always tries to find local connections through either the men or the regiments.

Adam Nightingale: Captain John Deane, Wilford's Village's Reluctant Cannibal

Wilford native Captain John Deane was a sailor, merchant, soldier and secret agent. He was also a reluctant cannibal. Shipwrecked off the coast of New England in 1710, John Deane and his crew were forced to eat human flesh to survive. The resulting scandal was just the beginning of a life of misadventure that took Captain Deane to Russia as a mercenary for Peter the Great, and to Amsterdam and Ostend spying on Jacobite troublemakers for the British Government. Join Adam Nightingale as he tells the fascinating story of one of Nottingham's great forgotten 18th Century anti-heroes.

Adam Nightingale is an author, performer and podcaster. He has written five history books including *Murder and Crime: Nottingham* and *The Shipwreck Cannibals: Captain John Deane and the Boon Island Fleshing Eating Scandal*. Adam is a member of the spoken musical spoken word trio *The Fighting Nightingales*. He is the creator of the historical comedy character Professor Edvard von Goosechaser. He co-hosts the *Punching Up Movie Podcast*.

Stephen Walker: 'Bulwell, 1750-1880: Industrialisation and urbanisation in the Leen valley'

Stephen explores the evidence for the development of a Nottingham suburb through industrialisation and urbanisation.

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Bonington Gallery presents *A Semester in Nottingham, 1976*, an exhibition of photographs by American photographer and videographer John Dean.

In the Spring of 1976, Dean was a 20 year old visiting student from the Maryland Institute College of Art, taking part in an exchange programme with Trent Polytechnic (now Nottingham Trent University). During his short visit, he created a powerful body of work that captures Nottingham during a year of profound social and economic change.

Armed with a camera and quiet curiosity, Dean immersed himself in the rhythms of Nottingham life. Over the course of a single semester, he wandered the city's streets and parks — Hyson Green, Market Square, the Arboretum — capturing striking black-and-white portraits of residents going about their daily lives. The resulting images are both documentary and deeply personal, offering an intimate glimpse into the lives of Nottingham residents during this transformative era.

The exhibition marks a significant homecoming to the institution where Dean studied fifty years ago. Now, half a century on, these photographs will be exhibited, many for the first time, in the city where they were made.

First developed in Trent's own darkrooms (still situated next door to Bonington Gallery, in the School of Art & Design), these photographs have remained largely unseen for decades. Now, they return to the place of their origin, standing as a testament to the power of observational storytelling, told through the eyes of a visitor to the city.

John Dean has since built a distinguished career as a producer and videographer, creating historical and educational media for museums and non-profit organisations across the United States. Yet photography remains his first and most enduring creative language — a medium through which he continues to explore the intersections of memory, environment, and human experience.





Feb 23 **Gary Stevenson – “You were here” – Nottinghamshire maps**
This will be a presentation of a geographical survey through time from 1500 to 1900 of maps of Nottingham and Nottinghamshire (including Lambley), but there will be some actual maps to look at too.

Mar 23 **Tom Andrews – Captain Athelstan Popkess, the Greatest Policeman**
Could it be possible that one man is responsible for the transition of British policing from its Victorian era beat model, to the modern responsive, mobile era? If there is such a candidate, that man would be Capt Athelstan Popkess, chief constable for Nottingham City police for nearly thirty years, who oversaw the introduction of police cars, police radios, forensic science, and the burglar alarm, among much else.

Apr 27 **David Longford – Framework Knitting and the Celebration of May Day**
Susan Russell and David Longford will present an illustrated talk about their work at the Framework Knitters Museum in Ruddington, alongside the wider history of framework knitting and its role in the unique celebrations of May Day. This includes Lambley's very own Cowslip Sunday.

May 12 **Guided tour of Ruddington Framework Knitters Museum**
Following David's talk, he will take us to discover how framework knitters and their families lived and worked there in Victorian times, telling the 400 year history of framework knitting, from its role in the Industrial Revolution to the infamous Luddite riots of the 1800s, and how framework knitting gave birth to the Nottingham lace industry.

June 09 **Guided walk round Southwell**
Members of Southwell Local History Society will take us round Southwell looking at all the major historical points.

July 07 **Guided tour of the Walks of Life Museum, Tuxford**
Our guide will show us round The Walks of Life Museum which is home to a unique collection of hand-pushed vehicles collected by the late Dorothy Harrison, and many other items. Afterwards, there is also an option to visit the Museum of the Horse, just a short walk away.

Sep 28 **Graham Hayes – the Da Vinci inventions**
Leonardo Da Vinci was one of the most amazing men that ever lived. His fields of interest included Painting, Sculpting, Architecture, Music, Anatomy, Geology, Cartography, Botany, Writing and Inventing. Although he was accomplished at all these things, it is mainly his inventions Graham will talk about at this meeting

Oct 26 **Chris Weir – Lace, Slums & the Occasional Riot! The Making of Old Nottingham**
This talk explores the character of Victorian Nottingham, highlighting hosiery and lace, the delights of Goose Fair, the impact of T.C. Hine and other notable architects and the struggles of the labouring classes.

Nov 23 **Keith Small – The History of Tobacco and Its Effect on Nottinghamshire**
This talk follows the discovery of tobacco for Europe, with claims of its medicinal value, the rapid development of tobacco products as socially accepted habit and

the effects of the two World Wars on the tobacco market. As a focus point, John Players family history in Nottingham working up to ITL's Horizon Factory becoming the only UK manufacturer of tobacco products, followed by the total loss of the industry to European manufacturers and the growth of substitute products.

The General Strike of 1926



A talk by Professor Emeritus Chris Wrigley

The General Strike was a solidarity action with the miners called by the TUC. Following the end of the First World War and the brief post-war economic boom, coal owners wanted to slash miners' wages. The TUC called trade unionists out in sequence but many trade unionists did not wait and walked out. The government mobilised many strikebreakers, the better-to-do saw it as great fun. In fact, there was a great deal of bitterness and much victimisation at the end.

Covers aspects of the county’s history often overlooked here – but celebrated in far-off corners of the Globe!

Worksop, Witches and a Place in American History: the Life of Richard Bernard: Richard Bernard was born in Tudor Epworth and became a great figure amongst the puritans and separatists under James I based mainly at Gainsborough and Worksop. Later he became a great writer, influenced John Bunyan and his daughter helped found a state in America. Today he is best-known for his authoritative guide on witches, based on his experience in Worksop!

Rebels and Radicals: the turbulent early Quakers from Notts: the Quakers were the most radical religious group of their day, challenging law and order wherever they went. They began in Mansfield with George Fox, their first meeting place was probably in Skegby, and their first ‘martyr’ was James Parnell of Retford. They travelled the world, courting controversy wherever they went and often they went to prison and suffered beatings.

Historical Highlights from Bassetlaw: the Bassetlaw region of North Notts is little known, yet it is an area with an amazing history full of battles, bravery, scandal and...some beautiful places. This is a personal selection of the most interesting places in the area and what they can tell us about its history.

Historical Highlights from Newark and Sherwood: this is a personal selection of the most interesting historical sites in Newark and Sherwood District – lost medieval fragments, forgotten villages, vanished castles, the forgotten world of the medieval fishpond and much more! Lots of pictures and ideas for doing some exploring of your own.

The Capricious Trent – the Battle between People and the River Trent: the course of the lower River Trent from Farndon and Averham to Gainsborough and beyond has seen some remarkable events in English history as people have struggled to keep it under control. This talk introduces you to the lost channels, great floods and little village ferries that illustrate the course of this most intriguing of England’s rivers.

Myths and Legends of the ‘Mayflower’ Story: the ‘Mayflower’ story is one that has ‘grown in the telling’ with many false claims and even monuments in the wrong place.
